


DAILY FLIGHT ACTIVITY

MCO Operations - January




FLIGHT ACTIVITY BY AIRLINE

MCO Departing Passengers January





Arriving International Flights - January








MCO Daily Vehicle Count - January



MCO DEPARTING SEAT CAPACITY COMPARED TO 2019




ENPLANEMENT ESTIMATES AT 60%, 70% & 80% LOAD FACTORS





ITEM DESCRIPTION

Recommendation to Approve Supplemental In-Terminal Relief Resolution for Duty Free/Duty Paid Concession

BACKGROUND

The Aviation Authority Board adopted actions and resolutions for various concession relief programs in April 2020, May 2020, August 2020, March 2021 and related specifically to the Duty Free/Duty Paid Concession (Duty Free) on October 2021. The reasons for those actions were set forth in Board memoranda and Board presentations during those Board meetings.

Although passenger traffic continues to improve, support for duty free shopping continues to lag. November 2021 duty free sales averaged 30% of sales compared to November 2019. Duty free sales averaged 45% of comparable 2019 sales for December 2021. In early 2022, duty free sales averaged 43% of prepandemic sales. GOAA should encourage and support a robust duty free shopping program as international duty free buyers return to the market. In balancing these issues, Staff has developed a new Resolution for the Aviation Authority Board's consideration. Currently the Duty Free/Duty Paid Concession is operated by DFASS Central, LLC.

ISSUES

The Aviation Authority has the discretion, under the current economic circumstances, to recognize certain businesses have suffered economically and to respond accordingly. Where it can do so with fiscal prudence, the Aviation Authority can offer relief to its business partners in order to allow them the best opportunity to succeed during this uncertain period. The Aviation Authority has taken a prudent, step-by-step approach to managing its financial commitments and the financial pressure applied to various concessionaires.

Because the international duty free sales have been slow to recover, staff proposes to extend short-term relief of a 50% reduction in the Minimum Annual Concession Fee (MACF) to Duty Free. The relief would be for the period of February 1, 2022 through March 31, 2022. In order to qualify for this extended relief, the all conditions contained in previous resolutions must be met in addition to:

- Duty Free must be fully operational and current in all financial obligations to the Aviation Authority.
- If Duty Free has a claim for insurance proceeds which includes amounts waived by the Aviation
 Authority, and succeeds in those claims, the amounts paid to Duty Free or those claims from the
 insurance company shall be due to the Aviation Authority without further demand.
- Duty Free shall continue to pay the greater of 50% of the MACF or, if sales are more robust, the percentage rents due pursuant to its agreement with the Aviation Authority.
- The benefits of this relief must be shared with ACDBE partners.
- Absent an unanticipated reduction in international traffic, this relief will be the last offered for DFASS Central LLC.

ALTERNATIVES

The Aviation Authority Board could choose not to approve these proposed Relief Resolutions.

FISCAL IMPACT

The fiscal impact, if percentage rent above 50% MACF is not achieved, is approximately \$354,923. The impact would be less if duty free shoppers return in greater numbers before March 2431, 2022.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is respectfully requested that the Aviation Authority Board resolve to: (1) approve Supplemental In-Terminal Relief Resolution for Duty Free/Duty Paid Concession; (2) authorize the Aviation Authority Chairman and Chief Executive Officer to execute the Resolution; (3) authorize the Chief Executive Officer to have discretion to enforce the terms and conditions of the Resolution; and (4) authorize the Chief Executive Officer to execute those documents necessary to carry out this Resolution upon satisfactory review by legal counsel.
